



Mill Hall Farm open garden for NGS

Kate and Jonathan Berry are opening their garden, Mill Hall Farm at Whitemans Green, Cuckfield, in aid of the National Garden Scheme (NGS) for the first time on Sunday 10th June. The NGS raised £3million last year, shared between charities, including Marie Curie, Macmillan Cancer Support and Parkinson's UK.

Jonathan has had Shetland sheep at the farm for many years, though now only eight are left. When Kate arrived from Lancashire in 2010, they decided to start afresh with the garden. Kate saw the wonderful view and started to create a new garden, hoping to enhance the already beautiful landscape using plants she could not easily grow in the North West and other plants which she likes.

It is a young 2½ acre garden with a lovely northward facing view sloping down to a pond with lots of wildlife in and around it, including an occasional kingfisher coming and going when he can find some food to dive for.

Planting began in March 2012 after the house extension was completed. The first tree to be planted was a cercidiphyllum, sometimes known as caramel tree for the light caramel smell it emits during leaf fall. Kate brought this with many other plants, shrubs and trees to

There are two ancient oaks in the distance beyond the big pond, and the couple have put in smaller trees including a golden catalpa and a golden metasequoia, some cornus kousas and acers to provide colour, interest and texture closer to the house. There is a small orchard and a separate kitchen garden mostly on raised beds.

Admission £5 (goes to the NGS), children free. Homemade teas and plant sales in aid of Holy Trinity Cuckfield Roof and Fabric Appeal. Mill Hall Farm will be open between 12.30-5pm on Sunday 10th June.

Mr Stoneley to retire from school

Warden Park Academy is losing one of its legends when Head of School Rob Stoneley retires at the end of this summer term after 38 years service to the school.

Anyone aged between 11 and 53 who went to Warden Park will have met Mr Stoneley, that is around 55,000 people!

Mr Stoneley, pictured in his legendary 'Friday Tie', said the decision to finally quit had not been an easy one.

"Having been a part of such a wonderful organisation for so long, this has been a very difficult decision for me," he told Cuckfield Life.

"Unfortunately my birth certificate doesn't lie! The school has gone from strength to strength throughout my time here.

"I have met many fantastic people, students and staff alike. I would like to thank everyone associated with the school for their support over the years. Now it is time for me to relax, play more golf and do all those things I have never had time to do!

"I have worn that tie every Friday for 30 years! The students love it. If I ever forget I am inundated with 'where is your Friday tie?'," he comments.

Warden Park Headteacher Dom Kenrick paid tribute

to Mr Stoneley in the school newsletter:

"Given his length of service and the senior roles that he has held here, the contribution he has made to the success of Warden Park and the support and guidance he has given to many thousands of students and families

over many years cannot be overstated," he said.

"Mr Stoneley started his career at the school in September 1980 as a teacher of history and PE. His abilities were soon recognised and he has held a number of key positions in the school, including Curriculum Leader. In 1995 he was promoted to the Senior Leadership Team as Senior Teacher and in 2003 to Assistant Headteacher. In September 2013 he was promoted to Deputy Headteacher and two years ago to joint Head of School.

"On a personal note I am very sorry to be losing such an experienced, highly respected and valued member of staff."

Mr Stoneley has decided to use his retirement as an opportunity for charity fundraising as opposed to a personal gift. Eleven BPM students across four different crews, aged between 8 and 18, joined forces at short notice to create 'Last Minute'. They were aptly named as they had only three rehearsals to learn a two minute routine – a difficult challenge in itself – to perform at the BDO Championships held in the legendary Blackpool Tower Ballroom.



The hard work of attending competitions across the south in order to qualify for Blackpool and then learning this new routine paid off massively. They were crowned Under-14 Intermediate BDO British Champions against ten other crews. A huge achievement, and the moment was caught on film, with the elation evident on everyone's faces. They also had many students successful in reaching finals in Solos and Duos.

Over the weekend of the 27th April, BPM attended the National Street Dance Challenge in Camber Sands. Another prestigious event in the street dance world, this event was celebrating its 10th year. Students competed in Solos, Duos, Quads, Crews and Big & Little. The parents were not to miss out either, with some taking part in parent crew to be crowned third out of eight crews!



There is a big build up to this weekend as all four crews, Logic, Titan, Eclipse and Nocturnal, attend with extra rehearsals in place in preparation. BPM performed superbly, coming home with a serious amount of trophies across all categories. Logic placed an incredible second out of 11 crews in a very hard age category, Under 14 Newcomers, with the students ranging from ages 6 to 11. Titan were also on top form and came first out of five crews, Eclipse placed second and Nocturnal in the Under 18 Advanced placed second out of four crews. A huge achievement for everyone involved and BPM's founders and choreographers, Kat Chase and Luke Bohanna, came away from the weekend beaming.

Luke said: "We couldn't be more proud of the students – and parents! It's so important for us to see dance have its place in Mid Sussex, as the arts have an incredible impact on everyone's lives. We most recently have become involved with sponsoring Warden Park Dance Department to ensure that dance continues to grow and offer opportunity to local students.

Solar panels for the school?

There's a great push for renewable energy at the moment. The press were recently lauding the fact that the UK managed three days without the need to generate electricity from coal-fired power stations simply on the back of renewable energy.

There are possibilities for renewable energy schemes on a much smaller scale within Bolnore Village, or indeed anywhere else. We just need to make a start! A number of residents already have solar panels on their roofs, so why not on the school or the Woodside?

The Bolnore Village Community Interest Company has initiated conversation both with residents and with renewable energy firms within the local area and the results are encouraging.

At the moment we are in discussion with a local community energy scheme who plan to make a site visit to Bolnore in May. Once that is complete we will hold a further consultation meeting in conjunction with them, at which a potential scheme will be laid out.

All questions can then be answered by the experts on hand. Such schemes generally provide energy at around a one third saving over existing costs and are able to generate returns on investment of around 5% per annum over a 20 year period.

Another idea being reviewed is the provision of electric car charging points in the Village Square which would operate on a 'pay as you go' basis. If you are interested to know more or would like to invest, email us: estate@bolnore.org.uk

A BVCP Trustee commented: "Unfortunately, due to a change in resources and a drop in the number of participants, we're ending the Bolnore Lotto.

Street food vans postponed

Following a Fish and Chip van's first excursion to Bolnore Village Square last month, Bolnore Village Community Interest Company has decided to place a temporary stop on food vendors coming to the village.

In a statement made on 12th April, Bolnore CIC explained: "We have not 'banned the vans from the village' as some have suggested. But the lack of care and consideration by the Fish and Chip van in particular, was so significant that we are forced to immediately review all commercial use of the square over the next four weeks."

Both Funky Fish & Chips and Fab's Pizza operate on a street trading licence issued by Mid Sussex District Council – and both have indicated that they'd like to return to Bolnore if at all possible.

Fab's Pizza has been coming to Bolnore for nine months. Owner Fabrice Ortarix said: "I was surprised of course. We are offering a service and don't want any negative impact, we want people talking about us in a good way."

Bolnore CIC is exploring other locations within the village centre for such traders, including suggestions which would be public highway (but at a reasonable distance from homes) and therefore not require permission.

One of the things we've learnt in putting this display together is that vintage dresses very rarely fit on to modern mannequins. Women were either naturally smaller in the past or pulled their corsets really tight – one way or another a 20 inch waist seems to have been the norm. Another surprise was the number of girls who chose to get married in colours other than white. For example, we have the blue Victorian fringed bustle two-piece worn by a prosperous butcher's daughter on her wedding day, a dusky blue crepe dress with elegant embellishment for a wartime bride and a home-made purple velvet gown for a local farmer's daughter.

For the babies, we also show simple teething toys and pacifiers that have not really changed much over centuries and cherished examples of christening gowns, handed down through generations, with only one problem – as well as adults, babies are getting bigger too.

In addition to objects from our own collection, generous loans from local residents, the Marian May Collection and from the Brighton Toy Museum, as well as Horsham and Henfield Museums, enable us to show some very special items, the oldest of which date back to the mid-17th century. Glamorous heating

DESIGN AT HOME

During cold snowy days not only do you want a warm home to come back to after working hard all day but perhaps something warm, snuggly and welcoming. Soft textures and warm colours go some way to add cosiness to an interior, whereas a log burner or open fire with their bright flickering flames warm, relax and soothe those winter blues away with their comforting light.

Central heating kicks in when the thermostat says so or when the boiler (if not frozen) wakes up. Central heating requires radiators, piping and pumps which take up precious space and demand maintenance. Tidier alternatives such as heated skirting boards and underfloor heating are good ways of hiding unattractive systems, while fan heaters, gas fires, electric fires, log burners are all great additional gadgets to boost heat in isolated areas. All functional and reliable, but how about swapping a heating system for one that is eye-catching looks great and ticks all the boxes in terms of doing a good job? Now to the glamorous bit, how about a heater that is disguised as a beautiful piece of artwork, a large family photo, a lovely piece of marble, a mirror, a piece of coloured or plain glass which can be hung on the wall or ceiling and heats the room using infrared? The options on electric infrared panels are vast in terms of design, and a new direction for interior decor. If the panels are attached to the ceiling you have more wall space for art work, photos, shelves etc and no ugly gurgling pipes. Electric infrared panels require less energy and are more environmentally friendly. Of course you will need a back up in case of a power cut but it's something to consider if you are doing a complete refurb to your property, building an extension or to have as a heating boost in a conservatory for example. There is a lot of technical info that needs to be considered, and a great website to provide this is www.acchaus.com. The blog by the founder is well worth reading.

Boiler powered central heating powered by gas does appear to be the cheapest option and can be glamorous depending on the choice of designer radiator and heated towel rail. Glass and mirror radiators are also available for central heating water systems if you don't want to change to infrared. There are some truly imaginative styles of radiator for water systems to suite all design styles, sleek, modern, coloured, slimline, tall, slim, cast iron Victorian etc. which would transform an interior. Alternatively cover up boring radiators with a radiator cabinet choosing an off the peg one or a bespoke one to fit the size of the space or to enhance interior style. Alternatively, an easy solution is to paint the radiator the same colour as the wall it's attached to so that it 'vanishes' into the wall and is not a feature as a white radiator against a coloured wall.

Unlocking the past

VILLAGE PEOPLE

'As soon as we moved to Cuckfield, it felt like the village welcomed us in straight away!"

The pride is evident the second Phillipa Malins selects the correct key from a huge bunch and unlocks the door to Cuckfield Museum.

Ok, she didn't burst through the threshold one arm raised shouting 'Tah-Dahl', but it's obvious she relishes her role as one of the museum's four curators and has an infectious enthusiasm for revealing its treasures.

"Before we chat I must show you around," she says. Around? The museum, situated upstairs in the Queen's Hall, is only a touch bigger than the average living room. But looks can be deceiving.

There are hundreds of interesting artefacts, carefully and skilfully displayed in cabinets, and Phillipa seemingly has an interesting titbit about pretty much all of them:

The agricultural bonnets worn by Victorian female farm workers – to stop them getting sun damage as porcelain skin was highly sought-after in that time.

The large ceramic collection that make up the first items donated to the museum, when it officially opened in 1981.

The fascinating secret cache of household items hidden under the attic floor in a house in Church Street.

And a moving collection of World War I memorabilia, including a Dorothy Bag containing the treasured items of a soldier, who survived a gas attack.

All delivered in her wonderful mellifluous voice, sharing knowledge she has acquired in more than a decade in the role.

Phillipa was at first reluctant to be interviewed by Cuckfield Life, not wanting to be seen as hogging the limelight in what is a team effort. "We couldn't run the museum without the other curators and our dedicated band of 48 stewards, who all volunteer to be here every week of the year," she says. "Being able to work in the museum is a huge privilege. Working here I have learnt so much about the village."

Phillipa is a relative newcomer to Cuckfield, arriving 13 years ago after a long spell in Lindfield.

She was actually born more than 4,000 miles from Sussex in East Africa as Phillipa explains:

"I was born in Kenya because my parents both went out after the Second World War to make a new start. My mother had been widowed in the war, so she went out to find a new job. My father came back from India to London and found it depressing, the weather was awful, they still had rationing.

"They were part of this wave of young people going out to Africa, the ship they went out on was full of young people looking for a new life. They actually met at Victoria Station, going to get the boat train to Marseille, and they fell in love on that boat."

Phillipa spent her first three years in Nairobi but the Mau Mau Uprising of the 1950s prompted a drastic change.

"My father had been called up as an auxillary and he was never at home. My poor mum was so anxious about the situation with me and my younger sister that



she felt she had to bring her babies home, so we came back to Hampshire and we lived close to her mother in Southsea."

Phillipa's arrival in Sussex came much later, after husband Jo got a job here, and the family moved initially to Lindfield in the early 1970s, then in various places around Mid Sussex before moving back to Lindfield after their children had grown and flown the nest.

In 2005 it was time to move again, this time to Cuckfield, where they have enjoyed life so much they've stayed put for 13 years.

So having lived in two of the best villages in Mid Sussex, which does she prefer?

"Oh definitely Cuckfield," she says. "When we lived in Lindfield the second time we never really felt that we belonged.

"As soon as I moved to Cuckfield, I knew the curator at the museum so I got involved here. That meant I met so many people almost immediately. It felt like the village just welcomed us in straight away.

"My husband walks our dog and he has discovered so many wonderful places around the village, and he loves living here, too.

"We live in a lovely road with a short walk to Holy Trinity Church and it's just heavenly.

"So many of our stewards will tell you that when they were growing up in the 50s they didn't have to leave the village to get anything. There were so many tradespeople here and a variety of shops, everything could be bought here. There was a department store, clothes, furniture, shoes, whatever. Haywards Heath was a special excursion because you didn't have to leave the village.

"Many Cuckfield shops now are independent and might be regarded as non-essential, but include the likes of hairdressers and dentists too. At least it's still a village with a tremendous amount going on, and hasn't been absorbed into Haywards Heath. It still has its own

identity.

"You can get involved very easily in things, like I did at the museum."

The museum has full accreditation status because of the quality of its displays, lighting, heating and professional standards in care and public services. As an entirely self-funded, volunteer run organisation, accreditation makes the museum eligible for grants, and also means people and other museums are willing to lend their treasured items.

"It's a huge privilege to handle the objects that people loan to the museum and to hear the stories behind them," says Phillipa.

So what would be the dream item someone could leave on the steps?

"Something that has been deliberately concealed that we can add to our cache collection," she says.

"I also have a fondness for World War I memorabilia. Fred Manville's Dorothy Bag is probably the item that is my favourite loan in my time here.

"On the one hand it's just a little bag made out of a scrap of material with an old handkerchief and some buttons and badges, but it represented so much of that man's history in the war.

"While Fred was gassed at that time and wounded more than once, he survived. His older brother, Ernest went through the war unscathed but was then killed in the spring of 1918.

"Ever since I first started learning about World War I at school I've been incredibly moved.

"I did a degree when I left school, worked for a language publisher, as a home visitor for vulnerable people, did another degree in Humanities with the Open University and then ended up working for them. All through my life I've been learning, so working here really is my dream job."

With spring finally here, for some of us, comes the dreaded signs of Hay Fever.

Hay Fever, is the term for the sneezing, runny, itchy, sometimes blocked nose, irritated and or streaming eyes and general congestion that effects people during spring and summer. It is also known as seasonal allergic rhinitis because the symptoms come back at the same time, or same season, each year. It is common and affects about two in every ten people in the UK; usually starting as a kid, but for most, eventually either completely going away or improving. It can run in families and it is strongly associated with other conditions like asthma and eczema. The good news is even severe cases do not cause serious problems for your overall health.

The main culprit is not actually hay! Well, at least not on its own. It is in fact pollen from the grasses used to make hay (pollen being the powdery stuff plants and trees release to reproduce). Grass pollen is the most common between May and July but tree pollens are also a big problem and start a bit earlier in March. Weed pollen from nettles and docks can also get you from early spring right through until autumn.

The symptoms are due to your immune system reacting to the tiny pollen particles we breathe in or that get into our eyes. The lining of our nose and our eyes release chemicals (such as histamine) in response to the onslaught of the microscopic menace and this causes swelling and irritation. As the particles are so small there is little you can do to avoid exposure, so for some people treatment with medications is required. There are, however, some simple things you can do which will really help...

Check the pollen count and avoid activity that increases your exposure, such as cutting the grass or camping. Switch to showering before bed to reduce the pollen load you are carrying on your hair to eliminate some of your eye symptoms as you won't be rubbing your face in a pillow full of pollen!

There are car air vent filters you can fit, and some 'barrier' ointments you can buy at pharmacies which, applied under the nose, trap the pollen before you breathe it in.

Most of the typical treatments, anti-histamine tablets, nasal sprays and eye drops, are available to buy over the counter. Your local pharmacy team are experts in advising patients on what to try and most of these medications are no longer available on NHS prescription. Some patients need prescription medication, particularly if their hay fever is associated with asthma, so if your symptoms are not improving with the standard treatments and strategies please make an appointment for a routine check up to discuss this. The Allergy UK website is an excellent source of helpful tips and tricks which will prevent your hay fever from stopping you enjoying the season. www.allergyuk.org

Why go 'limited'?

LISTEN TO THE LAWYER

By Martyn Gooch, partner Rohan Solicitors Question: I am currently running my business as a sole trader, what are the advantages of becoming a limited company?

Answer: If you are a sole trader and your business expands and becomes more profitable it may be time to consider changing its structure to a limited company, especially if you are seeking financial investment to grow the business further. However, the decision has significant legal, taxation and financial implications that you should carefully consider.

As a sole trader you are personally liable for the debts of your business. That may not be an issue if, for example, you are a part-time gardener with ten customers all of which are friends and family. In this case your liability if you cease trading is minimal (if anything). However imagine if you employ staff, you get a business account with a supplier where you buy plants, your customer base grows and you even secure a contract to work on a new housing estate. As a sole trader you would remain liable for the debts of the business. Your liability now is dramatically increased and should you unexpectedly cease trading without, say, paying employees, settling supplier accounts or finishing jobs, you would be personally liable to those creditors.

The primary benefit of changing from a sole trader to a limited company is that you will no longer be personally liable for debts that your company might incur. A limited company has its own legal status. This means your customers and suppliers contract with the company and not with you personally. You, the business owner, will typically be a director and a shareholder. Investors in the business can be granted shares and legal documentation can be put in place to dictate the rights and obligations of the directors and shareholders.

There are tax advantages to 'going limited'. Though you will be liable to pay Corporation Tax on profits that the company makes (the rate of which depends on how much profit is made) these rates are significantly lower than those personal rates that you pay as a sole trader. Furthermore, as a company you can pay yourself (as a shareholder) dividends instead of a salary, which can, in certain circumstances, be more tax advantageous.

Additionally, having limited company status may be regarded by your customers (and your competitors) as being more professional. It demonstrates you take yourself and your business seriously and is likely to instil confidence in existing and potential new customers.

Professional legal advice should be sought when setting up a limited company to ensure that the transition is right for your business, you understand the requirement to report to Companies House and that appropriate legal documentation is in place.

By Joan Collins, President, Cuckfield Dramatic Society In the summer of 1994, Stephen Henderson, my husband Peter and I were at the memorial service in London of a delightful man, late of Cuckfield, named Philip Thomson-Walker, MBE and a war hero.

Cuckfield Parish Council had just taken over the running of the Queen's Hall and Stephen was on the Committee. He knew I had a long association with amateur dramatics and asked me if I would restart the Cuckfield Dramatic Society (CDS) using the Queen's Hall for productions – the parish council being anxious for the hall to be used by Cuckfield societies.

There had been a Cuckfield Dramatic Society 30 years earlier. Robin and Angela Fox, parents and grandparents of the well-known acting dynasty, and Basil Boothroyd, a deputy editor of Punch, were members. Steuart and Ann Went kept some photographs of the original Society, a selection of which can be seen at the Cuckfield Museum. Although Steuart is unfortunately no longer with us, Ann still lives in Cuckfield. That incarnation of the society closed in the 1960s as people aged or moved away.

At that time I was organising and directing A Man for all Seasons in the now defunct Professional Players Theatre in Haywards Heath and thus I could not be further involved initially with CDS.

The new CDS had an enthusiastic meeting later in 1994, following which I asked Angela Fox to be our first president. John McKenzie was our first Chairman with the first committee meeting being held in Angela's house in Ockenden Lane - and the new CDS was on its way!

Colin Tremblett Wood, a retired Head of English at Ardingly College, agreed to direct our first play in the spring of 1995. He chose Confusions by Alan Ayckbourn. The production involved - in some capacity - everyone who was a member!

We were a group to some extent made up initially of strangers and therefore limited in our knowledge of the talent - or otherwise - of the members and of the Queen's Hall in regard to putting on a play. Confusions also had numerous set changes which required back

stage and teamwork together with front of house. We must have been mad, but, as they say, ignorance is bliss! What we did have in abundance was enthusiasm and that was, and is, the magic ingredient. The play was a great success, and as our reputation grew members from other dramatic societies joined us from time to time. We have won various awards both 'on stage and backstage'.

Another new member was Maggie Williams who succeeded Colin as Head of English at Ardingly College and then worked at The Globe in London writing the programme notes for their productions. In her later years she and her husband David brought their vast experience to CDS.

When we produced Murder in Play by Simon Brett, we were honoured by his attendance at the Saturday night performance. He stayed for at least an hour at the end, talking to members of the cast and company.

Some years ago our standards slipped, as eventually happens with most societies. Martin and Harriet Sheldon, with others, worked hard to keep CDS functioning and more recently Paul Davey took us into the computer age. At the moment we are back riding on the crest of a wave again, with the considerable help of enthusiastic new blood and fresh ideas.

Nowadays besides our spring and autumn play we have club nights or social evenings, the annual February Frolics (a one act play and sketches with a meal), and for the last three years we have held our Christmas Cabaret, when the Queen's Hall is magnificently decorated according to the theme of the evening. From time to time we have workshops, while we even have a mini touring company! We have been invited to perform our plays and murder mysteries on other local stages together with fundraising performances for local charities such as the Rotarians.

Richard Willis a professional writer who lives in Cuckfield, together with another member Paul Ruse, wrote the comedy Bridge to Farce for us. It began at the February Frolics as a single act before being extended to a full length play as our spring show in 2017. After a great reception we toured with it to Hurstpierpoint



in the summer, and this year Paul and Richard are putting it on at The Capitol in Horsham in August, with many CDS members in the cast.

Please join us either as a member of the audience or as a full member. We are always looking for new skills in any branch of the theatre or just someone to join in with the fun.

Carrot cookies (Eathot or cold)

½lb carrots

2 tablespoon cooking margarine

3 tablespoonfuls sugar

5 tablespoonfuls self-raising flour.

(I think these would be serving tablespoons not the measuring spoons we use today)

Cream together the margarine and nearly all the sugar, keeping back 1 dessertspoonful. Grate the carrot and beat it into the margarine and sugar. Fold in the flour lightly until the dough is soft and creamy. A tablespoonful of water can be added if the carrots happen to be dry ones. Drop spoonfuls of the mixture into greased patty pans. Sprinkle the tops with sugar and put in the oven and cook for about 25 minutes. Eat hot or cold. NB: no temperature given but try 160°.

On a recent visit to Cuckfield Museum (if you haven't been yet, do go – it is excellent) I came across a leaflet entitled The Kitchen Front. Many of the wartime recipes were contributed by Mrs Phyl Bowring from Little Mizbrooks Farm plus others from the Ministry of Food. They are a fascinating insight into how housewives managed to feed their families with so many key ingredients in very great short supply.

I did not know that Lord Woolton, the very successful Minister for Food during the Second World War, lived with his first wife Maud in Cuckfield. Before being given that position by Churchill he was a very successful business man in retailing. Tasked with overseeing the purchase, control and distribution of supplies he was recognised as being highly successful at the job despite the Nazis' intention to starve us and was known affectionately by the British people as 'Uncle Fred'. Born in 1883 he died in 1961. He was honoured with a pie being

named after him! Consisting of a selection of mainly root vegetables in a sauce thickened with oatmeal it was topped with potato pastry and 'a very little grated cheese' and baked until golden brown.

The leaflet includes recipes for such dishes as Liver Rissoles, Ox Foot Soup (one ox foot would make enough stock to supply soups for a week, with the addition of lentils, vegetables, haricot beans and tomatoes), Stinging Nettle Puree – to be served with poached eggs, Vegetable Sausages and Carrot Cookies. Not so very different from today's Carrot Cake why not try them, perhaps using butter instead of the suggested margarine?



Asparagus Starter

Back to $201\overline{8}!$ Enjoy our homegrown asparagus with this simple starter.

Put some trimmed asparagus spears (about 250g for two people) into a shallow dish with a handful of frozen peas. Sauté some chopped streaky bacon, chopped spring onions and garlic in a little butter until just cooked. Spoon over the vegetables and bake for 15 min 180° - check after 10 min – asparagus should be still slightly firm. Serve piping hot.

RECYCLE THIS...

WSCC Recycling Ambassador Colin McFarlin sheds some light on what can and can't be recycled in our domestic blue bins. If you have a question for him, email: editor@cuckfieldlife.co.uk

One of the most frequent questions I get asked is about plastic milk bottles, and tops in particular.

The easy one first...

All plastic milk bottles can be recycled in your blue top recycle bin. Do not worry about removing the label. In the recycling process this is removed.



However, milk bottle tops CANNOT be recycled in your blue top bin. Let me explain. Yes, it is plastic but it is the size that is the issue. When all your recycling arrives at the West Sussex Recycling plant at Ford one of the first processes is to remove glass.

This is done by allowing the broken glass to fall through the holes in the large drum, called a Trommel. However, the small plastic lids are small enough to also fall through the holes and pollute the glass. No plastic lids smaller than coffee jar lid size please.

Did you know that charities collect these milk bottle tops, and raise money? Do let us know if you are aware of a charity that collects these and where they can be dropped off. Or are you a charity that would like to start collecting and raise funds for your charity? I look forward to hearing from you.

I'm always asked about window envelopes. These CAN be recycled in your blue top recycling bin. Historically this was not always the case. However, the recycling process was improved some time ago and we can now accept all window envelopes, white or brown!



This plastic cereal packet CANNOT be put in the blue bin, as it is made of a type of plastic that cannot be recycled. The way to tell if it can be recycled is what we call the 'Scrunch Test'. Crunch it up in the palm of your hand and when you open your hand does it spring back open. If it



springs open it CANNOT be recycled. Crisp packets are the same, they CANNOT be recycled.




