Park make it to County Cup Final

The U12 Girls Football team at Warden Park
Academy has progressed into the County Cup
Final after a fantastic performance against
Tanbridge House. The girls have been in the last

in 2017 and 2018. However this is the first



Frances Hodgson Burnett, author of The Secret Garden once remarked; 'As long as one has a garden, one has a future; and as long as one has a future, one is alive'.

We're less than a week away from the first official day of spring and local horticulturalist and allotment cultivator Claire Mitchell can't wait to start digging and to plant this year's flowers and vegetables.

"I love being outside. Being around nature and getting my hands into the earth. It is such a positive and valuable experience. It certainly grounds me and makes me feel good." $\frac{1}{2} \int_{-\infty}^{\infty} \frac{1}{2} \int_{-\infty}^{\infty} \frac{1}{2$

Claire's allotment in friendly Cuckfield is far away from her former life in Nairobi, where she was born and raised. Her father, a retired solicitor, still lives there.

"It is a sprawling metropolis now. Not quite like the place that I remember growing up. The population used to be somewhere around 300,000 but there are just so many more people now, close to five million. I'm not sure I would recognise Nairobi today, to be honest. It was an amazing place to grow up and I have many happy memories of my time there."

One such happy memory was working on the 1985 film Out of Africa. Claire helped her stepmother in her production office and subsequently worked as a personal assistant for author Errol Trzebinski, whose book Silence Will Speak was used in the making of the film.

While doing this job she lived in Mombasa on the coast of Kenya. Her boyfriend at the time was a spearfisherman who made his living selling fresh fish such as barracuda and kingfish, along with lobsters, to local restaurants.

"I remember hot days on the coast, living easy by the sea. It was certainly different to life in Cuckfield – but both are lovely in their own way," Claire commented.

The distance between Kenya and the south of England became smaller for Claire when she was younger, sent off on a plane to go to school at Ancaster House in Bexhill. Her brother Marcus joined her and went to Hurstpierpoint College.

"I found the winter term very chilly and I used to sleep with my uniform on my bed, ready to get into in the morning!"



Claire left Kenya for good and moved back to the UK some 30 years ago. Here she met her late husband Mitch, and in 1997 they moved to Cuckfield with their son Luke. This is where her interest in gardening grew too.

"For me the allotment is about nurture. It's about being outside. It's about investment and seeing the fruits – pardon the pun – of your labour come to life. The plot produces just that; life and in many forms, be that vegetables, fruits or flowers. I also grow wildflowers to encourage bees and other insects."

Each year Claire enters vegetables, flowers and photographs into the Cuckfield Village Show. Almost every year her endeavours are awarded with a prize. Some of Claire's recent accolades have been for things such as the 'heaviest marrow', 'Dahlia blooms' and last year a prize for a photograph.

"Sadly, I didn't enter any vegetables last year. Mainly because it was too hot and most of what I had grown had either died or simply stopped growing due to heat exhaustion. It didn't matter how much I watered things either."

Claire also sits on the Cuckfield NSPCC committee and helps out with the annual Plant Sale in May. This year you will see her courgette plants on sale, which she has been cultivating in her greenhouse.

Most people in the village will probably know or recognise Claire because of Lola; her trusted shaggy canine friend of nine years.

"I'm always out and about and most of the time Lola is by my side. If I don't have Lola with me people always come up and say 'where is Lola? Is she okay?'"

A number of years ago Claire started up a small gardening club at Holy Trinity School where she and a friend encouraged children to get more involved in gardening and more immersed in their natural environment. She was also on the Grounds Committee for many years, assisting in various projects and maintenance of the wonderful outdoor facilities they have there.

"We used to grow giant pumpkins on the allotment. The pumpkins would go to the school, then on to the Village Show, then to the Harvest Festival. Finally, they would go to Bonfire Night to be used as jack o-lanterns."

Having an outdoor space is particularly important to Claire, who finds that first-hand contact with nature is conducive to good physical and mental health.

Gardening's positive effects on the human spirit are well documented, and research suggests that spending time with your hands in the soil can improve good mental health and overall well-being.

Claire finds herself deeply concerned about human impact on nature, so she does what she can to help – whether it be at the local school or on her own patch.

"I worry about the planet, about the animal kingdom, the plastic in our seas and our responsibility to it. I think about the future and the generations of young people – including my son – wondering if we are, in fact, too late to save it."


It's a sobering thought. But it won't be long before Claire (and Lola) can visit their favourite outdoor space in Cuckfield when the bluebell season arrives at New England Woods next month.

"It's such a beautiful sight to see. It is literally a carpet of bluebells; I love the way the sunlight glistens through the trees into the woodland below. That's what nature does to you. Its impact is so profound. It can simply take your breath away."

Taking Claire as an inspiration, why don't you dust off the gloves, find that trowel with a broken handle and start growing something in Cuckfield's rich, fertile soil?



Could you organise Cuckfield's Poppy Appeal?

Long-standing Cuckfield resident and Poppy Appeal Organiser Peter Negus has been working as a volunteer supporter of the Royal British Legion (RBL) for over 20 years now. Peter first began making his collections in Copyhold Lane in the late 90s, and 12 years ago he was invited to organise the appeal throughout the village. Not only does Peter's involvement mean helping to raise funds for the Poppy Appeal but it also includes increasing awareness and promoting the profile of the appeal.

2018 was particularly important for the Poppy Appeal as it marked the Centenary of the Armistice that ended the First World War.

Peter explains: "I was heavily involved in liaising with the 'Cuckfield Remembers' committee regarding many of the commemorative events that were organised around the Armistice Centenary Day at the end of last year and was lucky enough to be part of such a memorable and historic moment in my lifetime."

The Poppy Appeal in Cuckfield is just a small part of a nationally led campaign which last year alone raised over £50m to enable the Royal British Legion to support former members of the armed forces and their families.

Peter continues: "The public have been very supportive of the Poppy Appeal over the past few years as a result of the publicity related to the various centenaries connected with the First World War, coupled with an awareness of the part played by our military personnel recently in Iraq and Afghanistan. In Cuckfield alone we have seen our fundraising efforts increase over the years from £5,000 12 years ago to just under £11,000 this year."

The Cuckfield arm of the RBL is quite separate from the Poppy Appeal, although Peter does work closely with the local branch and a number of its members are collectors for the Appeal.

The RBL was formed in 1921 in order to support current and former military staff and their families. Whilst surviving servicemen from the First World War are now thin on the ground, there are participants and their families from more recent conflicts, from the Second World War to Iraq and Afghanistan, that rely on the RBL for assistance and support. Sadly, the world continues to be a dangerous place and further conflicts cannot be ruled out; meaning that support from the RBL may well be needed in the future and for many years to come.

As Poppy Appeal Organiser for Cuckfield, Peter coordinates 30 house to house collectors together with 70 other outlets - shops, pubs, schools, garages etc - around the village. However, after 12 years Peter is now looking to hand over the reins to someone new; to an individual who is willing to support this noble cause and be happy to spend a couple of months a year as Poppy Appeal Organiser right here in Cuckfield.

In addition, following the success and publicity generated by the recent 'Cuckfield Remembers' activities, the Cuckfield RBL is also seeking new members to join its band of dedicated volunteers.



The Cuckfield branch is principally associated with the Remembrance Sunday ceremony at Holy Trinity Church, but a revamped programme of social activities and speakers is being planned.

Whilst former serving members of the armed forces are always welcome, a military background is not necessary to become a member.

If you would like to support this wonderful charity, then why not join us at a special Curry Night being organised at Tamasha in Lindfield on Tuesday 9th April at 7pm.



Make a change, become a local Councillor

Cuckfield Parish Council is calling on residents passionate about their community to stand in the local elections in 2019.

What do Councillors do?

Councillors are the champions of their community and give residents a voice on the decisions the council makes. Becoming a Councillor will allow you to make a real difference in your community by engaging with residents, local groups and businesses to find out their needs; making decisions on which services and projects the council should take forward and getting involved locally to ensure the services are meeting your community's needs.

The main areas of focus for Cuckfield are:

- Reviewing planning applications against the Neighborhood Plan and District Plan and making recommendations to MSDC
- Working with WSCC Highways to identify and implement changes to the roads infrastructure to make Cuckfield a safer place for both pedestrians and traffic
- Focus on the immediate environment to ensure Cuckfield maintains its green spaces for the benefit of residents and visitors

Key areas of responsibility are:

- · The Cemetery, Observer Field and Nuclear Bunker
- Allotment sites at Courtmead Road and Whitemans Green
- · The Queen's Hall and Cuckfield Village Hall
- · Horsefield Green
- · Summer and winter planting schemes
- · Speed Watch and roving Speed Indicator Device
- · The annual Christmas Street Festival
- The future transfer of the green site at Buttinghill Drive
- Commenting on all planning applications relevant to Cuckfield

How long does it take?

The National Association of Local Councils (NALC) Local Councillor Census Survey found that Councillors put aside, on average, three hours a week for council work. This often includes attending meetings, engaging with residents and speaking on behalf of the council to other bodies. All the work is managed through a series of committees, so your time commitment will vary according to how many Committees you choose to join. Currently Cuckfield Parish Council meets once every three weeks for the planning committee, with other committees meeting three or four times a year.

Can I stand?

There are only a few rules to stand for election. You must be:

- A British citizen, or a citizen of the Commonwealth, or the European Union
- 18 years of age or older
- · Live in an area that is served by a local council

Councillor Nominations

Councillor nominations may be delivered to MSDC any working day from Tuesday 19th March to Wednesday 3rd April 2019 between 9am and 5pm (4pm on 3rd April).

Eligibility of European Union Citizens

EU citizens will be eligible to stand at local government elections in May 2019. If elected, they may serve a full term irrespective of the manner of the United Kingdom's exit from the European Union.

Here in Cuckfield, the Parish Council is run with a maximum of ten Councillors who work together throughout the four year term to run projects and make improvements to the local village. Projects in the past have included the purchase of the Village Hall on London Lane and the implementation of traffic calming measures throughout the village.

Many of our hard-working Councillors have already served more than one term of four years and are considering a well deserved retirement from the Parish Council. In order for the Parish Council to continue to function there must be at least four elected Councillors; in order for the Council to complete any major projects

there must be at least seven elected Councillors.

If we do not have four elected Councillors, responsibility for Cuckfield would be assumed by Mid Sussex District Council, meaning all decision making for Cuckfield would take place at MSDC.

If you do not want this to happen, if you want to keep Cuckfield local and to continue to have a say and influence over what happens within your village, please consider applying to become a Councillor. This is a very rewarding role which gives you the opportunity to have a real say in what happens in your village. When we think of the hymn We Plough the Fields and Scatter the image that we often conjure up is one of a tractor turning over the soil preparing for harvest.

Most of the terrain surrounding Laines Organic Farm right here in Cuckfield is cultivated by hand, not by machinery. Largely by Toos Jeuken, a Dutch farmer who arrived in West Sussex not long after Britain joined the European Union.

Toos explains: "We came to Cuckfield after the UK entered the EU. That's why many Dutch farmers came to England at that time. Suddenly there was a great opportunity for farmers to grow things here."

Right now the subject of the EU may be a contentious one but, standing in a sunny field of giant kale, Toos finds some humour amidst all of the panic: "Do you think they might send me back to Holland now that we're leaving the European Union?"

All joking aside, Toos doesn't appear to be overly concerned about her passport status. Instead her motivation is clear; to ensure that her crops are protected and well nurtured in time for harvest.

Toos arrived in Cuckfield in 1977 - a year after her father bought the farm with the sole aim of using it to grow vegetables.

The landscape of Laines Organic Farm has changed over four decades. "They built the Cuckfield bypass in 1989," she explained, "and that split the farm in half. My Dad also sold the old house and some of the land so I now own 20 acres but that's more than enough to grow the sorts of vegetables we need."

Toos is a winter producer. She is also a certified biodynamic farmer who has for many years followed the Rudolf Steiner approach to alternative agriculture.

Steiner's principles were built upon creating socially responsible farming and the production of healthy products in a similar way to organic husbandry.

"I grow winter vegetables. I nurture the product in the summer and then when it is ready to deliver to the shops I pick it. It's always freshly picked."



Toos' philosophy is a simple one. She is an 'outdoor, seasonal field and vegetable grower'. Or that is what she likes to be called. She has an old-fashioned view of farming. She doesn't follow trends nor does she use modern technology to reap the rewards of the seeds that she sows.

If she were to show you her hands you'd see just how hard she works to produce the leeks, cauliflowers, broccoli and the many varieties of cabbages, kale and beetroot that she grows in the Cuckfield soil.

There's even a little farm shop on site which operates an honesty system selling seasonal produce and,



sometimes, apple presse taken from the Bramley apples that are grown in her orchard.

"I grow a few things in tunnels, so, when I attend the farmers markets, I have a bigger selection. I have some tomatoes in the summer, other fruit and winter salads. I like to grow everything naturally and under the sun."

Toos grew up with eight brothers and sisters, all involved in farming.

"I think it must be genetic. It's part of who we are. It's a passion we all share and one that will never go away. We all love it so much."

Perhaps the most interesting part of Toos' journey is discovering why she and her family chose Cuckfield as their home - the reason for this lies right under her feet.

"When this farm was up for sale, my father jumped at the chance because of the soil that lives here. This particular plot is called Horsham Greensand. There is just a pocket of it here. That is why we came here and why I am still here really. It is because of the soil. It's amazing!"

It's not all about life on the farm. Toos also likes to get involved in the wider community. For a year now she has been working with a local mental health group offering adults and young people the chance to help out on the farm.

As well as supporting local social causes, Toos also plays host to volunteers from all over the world. They're called "Wwoofers" – World Wide Opportunities on Organic Farms. Volunteers come to the farm for three or four weeks, usually over the summer, to experience life as an organic farmer.

Toos rarely takes a holiday or break from the farm. If she's lucky, she may go back to Holland for a visit but mostly her family comes to Cuckfield.

"When they visit, everyone comes; my brothers, my sisters, uncles, aunties, cousins, the children – all of them. They love it here."

So, where does the name Laines Organic Farm originate?

Toos explains: "The word 'Laines' means strips of land. Or open narrow pieces of land. And it also has a link to the North Laines in Brighton too, that I am sure."



It's a refreshing sight watching Toos as she stands in the midday sun pulling up her matured leeks.

"Look at the soil. It's so soft. It's just beautiful. It would be a crime not to grow vegetables on this piece of land. It's like a pudding!"

Toos is very open and thankful. She has great respect for the work that she does and for her land and the environment. "Isn't it amazing? For 40 years this soil has provided me with food and still it just keeps on giving."

Part of Toos' success as a farmer is clearly down to her positive attitude. That and her work ethic. She simply doesn't stop smiling.

Reflecting on her life on the farm and her love of Cuckfield, Toos concludes: "I am so happy I get to do this. I feel so lucky and I am so grateful. I love my job. I love, love my job!"

For the chance to taste some of Toos' delicious fruits and vegetables, Laines Organic Farm will be at Cuckfield Farmers Market, Talbot Courtyard on Saturday 13th April.







Notes from the AGM

The AGM of the Bolnore Village Community Interest Company took place last month at The Woodside. Nearly 20 residents attended as well as the full complement from the board of Directors.

Prior to the meeting the budget was reviewed by the Directors. It was important for us to understand the impact that any changes in budget would have on residents and a number of changes were requested that would mitigate some of the increases in costs.

It is important to note that, despite all of the effort undertaken by Pembroke during the past couple of years, a significant amount of remedial work still needs to be done. FirstPort only seemed to concentrate on the 'here and now', and as a result such areas as paving and estate owned access ways were ignored. The time has come to address these now and will come at a not insignificant cost.

The main objective of the meeting was to review and discuss the budget plans for the coming year. Pembroke Property Management Director Geoff Hollywood presented the plans and highlighted those areas where significant savings were made and where any increases were necessary.

Overall the costs for 2019-2020 have obviously increased, but only by a small percentage.

During 2018-19 the village landscaping company was changed and KPS, a local company, was appointed to take on the task. Significant improvements to the village have been made since that time but it was felt that more could still be done. As a result, an increase in expenditure was recommended. Part of the KPS arrangement is that they will take away from the village all the green waste, which they then turn into compost to be reused. This represents another saving to residents.

The cost associated with utilities in apartment blocks, as well as the continuing need to read the meters, has caused Pembroke some headaches over the past year. It has been agreed that all landlord meters will be converted to smart meters which will allow greater control over costs. This will be done over the coming year.

Pembroke presented a list of some dozen or so local contractors who have been regularly engaged in the village. The board will continue to push for this to remain in the coming years.

Nearly all of the apartment blocks were redecorated over the past year and the few remaining blocks will be completed in 2019. Including redecorating, there are some 40 projects currently under tender for work to be done during this year.

There was also a call for new board members to come forward and I'm pleased to report that a few residents expressed an interest in at least seeing what goes on before making a decision. We are still looking for more volunteers, and if anyone is interested and lives in Bolnore Phases 1-3, we'd be happy to have a discussion.



Halt a probate application

LISTEN TO THE LAWYER

Question: I am a beneficiary under a Will and I am concerned about the Will's validity. What can I do to stop the deceased's estate being administered?

Answer: If a family member or a beneficiary has concerns regarding the validity of a deceased's Will, it may be appropriate for a 'caveat' to be entered at the Probate Registry on their behalf. The caveat is a notice that prevents anyone being able to obtain a grant of probate of the deceased's estate, which, in turn, means that the estate cannot be administered while the caveat is in place. A caveat remains in force for a period of six months. This gives the concerned party time to investigate the issue and discuss it with the executors whilst protecting their position to bring a claim against the estate if they have grounds to. If it is necessary, a caveat can also be renewed every six months to prolong the period of protection.

To register the caveat, you must complete a form and send it to the local Probate Registry. This must include full details about the deceased person, as recorded in their death certificate, and their last permanent address. There is a fee of £20 payable when applying for a caveat. The executors of the estate will be alerted to the existence of the caveat when they apply for probate. They will be given a copy and may then choose to discuss the matter with you to resolve the concern. However, if they do not consider there is any justification for the caveat they may issue a 'warning' against you, again by filing a form at the Probate Registry. You will then be required to set out full details of why you are opposing the probate application, this is called entering an 'appearance'. Failing to respond to the warning within the prescribed timeframe is likely to result in the caveat being removed. If the appearance is accepted by the Probate Registry your caveat will then remain in force indefinitely until the disputed matters are resolved.

Whether a caveat continues to be appropriate will depend on the circumstances and it should be kept under review. Independent legal advice should be taken, as if an appearance is entered then the person applying for the caveat could face costs penalties from the court if the court feels it was inappropriate that it was applied for. Likewise, legal advice should also be taken by the executors when faced with a caveat as they could face costs sanctions if the court believes they have behaved unreasonably by warning off the caveat too soon, or at all.

A day out on the buses

For a few months now Cuckfield has had the benefit of Compass Travel's No. 31 bus, operating hourly on weekdays. On the basis that you 'use it or lose it', I should like to suggest you use the bus as much as possible.

If, like me, it is a pleasure for you to travel by bus and watch the world (and the people) go by, I'd like to suggest an itinerary, utilising bus 31, that would give you a day out when the weather, we hope, improves and the days lengthen. This is, of course, primarily intended for those of you who enjoy free bus travel with your national bus pass.

Start with the first available bus after 0930, which is the No. 31 which picks up at Longacre Crescent at 0933, Cuckfield High Street at 0936. Take it all the way to its terminus at Uckfield bus station, due 1031.

You may wish to linger a while in Uckfield for a coffee, but you can leave from the bus station as early as 1046 by the 29 bus that will take you to Tunbridge Wells arriving Monson Road 1135. The 29 runs every 30 minutes, so there is a bus at 16 and 46 minutes past each hour.

There's time for lunch, a walk round the shops at Royal Victoria Place or The Pantiles at the southern end of the town.

To be sure of getting back to Cuckfield with only one change, you should leave Tunbridge Wells (Royal Victoria Place) by the 29 bus at 1520, arriving Uckfield bus station 1611. The next bus, at 1555, arrives Uckfield 1647; although it ought to be on time, there is a risk that you might miss the last 31, due to leave Uckfield at 1650, as that is cutting it fine. The 1650 will bring you back to Cuckfield, due 1746 at the High Street. If you miss it, there is another 31 at 1750 from Uckfield, but it terminates in Haywards Heath. This should drop you in South Road at 1829. Caffe Nero will still be open, and you can refresh yourself there before returning to the same stop to pick up the 271 bus at 1911, which will bring you back to Cuckfield.

An alternative route home requires more stamina, but it will be a lovely run through the country in the spring. From Royal Victoria Place, get the 291 bus at 1640. This



will transport you via East Grinstead to Crawley bus station, arriving 1818. From there you can take the 271 bus leaving at 1840, which will drop you in Cuckfield High Street at 1906. Bon voyage!

Please note that these travel details apply on

Mondays to Fridays. Times on Saturdays may

be different, and there is no service on route 31 on Sundays. Bus routes and times are changed every so often, so if the magazine you are reading is 'old' by a few months, you should not rely on these schedules without checking.

Creamy leek bake (Serves 2)

Preheat the oven 180°. Thickly slice 450g slender leeks and place in a buttered shallow baking dish with some crushed garlic and a scattering of fresh thyme leaves. Add enough hot vegetable stock to just cover them, top with a lid or foil and bake until just soft when pierced with a knife. Meanwhile gently fry two salmon fillets in a little butter until just golden on both sides then place on top of the leeks. To the buttery residue in the frypan add 150ml whipping cream. Bring just to the boil, scraping up all the browned bits. Pour over the fish then add a layer of buttered fresh breadcrumbs and bake, uncovered, for about 15 min or until the fish is cooked through.

Macaroni cheese

Make your favourite cheese sauce, adding some gently cooked sliced leeks and chopped ham or crisply cooked bacon bits to it before mixing in the pasta.

I really think we should think hard about all the wonderful foods we grow in our own country and always buy ingredients for our dishes that are grown as close to home as possible – and in doing that we are not only eating healthily in season but supporting our growers.

Top of the list of my own favourite home-grown winter vegetable is the leek. Said to be prized by gourmets for centuries, Nero apparently believed eating enormous quantities would improve his singing voice and, in the 6th century, the Welsh made it their national emblem convinced it would give them strength to defeat their enemies. Perhaps that is why they have such good singing voices? Try my recipes and see what happens to your voice!

Rhubarb is technically a vegetable being a member of the sorrel family. First recorded as a drug in 2,700BC in China and Tibet, the first known recipe in Europe dates from 1608. The 'forcing' of rhubarb producing a more appetising and succulent vegetable/fruit happened quite by accident. In the Chelsea Physic Garden some roots were covered with earth (perhaps they had been thrown on the rubbish tip?) but when uncovered in 1817 were found to have grown bright pink stems. The Yorkshire Rhubarb Triangle – Wakefield, Leeds and Bradford – is registered by the EU as producing a unique regional food. Here rhubarb is grown in vast heated dark sheds where prized strains are handed down through the generations of a small number of families. The season is very short so don't miss it.

Leek and ham soup (Serves 4)

Thinly slice 6 slender leeks and 1 medium onion and gently cook in a knob of butter until pale golden brown. Stir in 2tbs plain flour. Gradually stir in 600ml hot vegetable stock, bring just to the boil and cook until slightly thickened. Cover and cook over low heat until the leeks are soft – about 20 min. Cool slightly then tip into a processor and buzz until almost smooth. Return to the pan and stir in 150ml single cream and 100g roughly chopped ham and heat to serving temperature – do not allow to boil. Season to taste and serve topped with some grated Caerphilly cheese.

Rhubarb and ginger crumble.

Make your crumble topping in the usual way but add some finely chopped preserved ginger (from a jar) to the fruit before covering with the crumble. Bake as usual and serve with lightly whipped double cream flavoured with more chopped ginger and some of the ginger syrup. Best served hot.

If you think of prime locations for a business in the village, Cuckfield Corner House Café has got it!

On the day I went to meet manager Lorraine Walker it was one of those gloriously sunny afternoons and the outside seating area was full with coffee-drinkers and sandwich-eaters, all keen to soak up some muchneeded rays of Vitamin D after what feels like an eternally overcast and wet winter!

Lorraine has worked at the Corner House Café for over ten years, and has been the manager for the last five. "I just like people," she explains when asked about what she loves about her job. And she's not the only one. The café employs eight staff and a number of them describe themselves as 'part of the furniture' – including Sarah Miller and Karen Sansom (pictured) who have both worked there since near the formation of the business.

"It's always a varied day," Lorraine says as she sweeps the floor and clears up after another busy day in the café. "We are very lucky to have so many regulars - we very quickly get to know their names. But, above all, we always want to be friendly and helpful – whether that's organising that desperate cup of coffee or helping someone to find their lost car keys – we've heard it all here," she goes on.



The café enjoys a broad range of customers. "We open at 7.30am during the week, so that can be popular for builders and tradesmen, whereas weekends are often busy with families out and about in Cuckfield," Lorraine explains. The team have been known to drop round lunch orders to fellow shopkeepers on the High Street, who are struggling to leave their shops to grab a sandwich! Whether it's children who have been coming to the Corner House since birth and still come after school, or the dogs who drag their owners up the steps for their doggy treats – the team are always pleased to see customers old and new. "We would like to say a big 'thank you' to all our customers," Lorraine went on, "who have continued to support us as a village business for so many years."

Lorraine, who is a mother-of-two and lives in the village, has always worked in hospitality, including other cafes. She even ran a pub in Balcombe for some years. But this role suits her well, and enables her work to fit around her family life.

You may have heard of some of the legendary fare on offer at the Corner House. "Our home-made cheese scones are always popular, and Sarah is the queen of the rock cake – which literally sell like hot cakes!" The café's bread supplier is Fellows in Ardingly and they buy meat from the Handcross Butcher to keep things local. Cuckfield baker Michele Dainty also makes 'the best' brownies, which you'll find on the counter too!

The café's menu is currently in the transition from homemade soups and warm sandwiches to salads and Ploughman's plates for when the warmer weather begins to kick in properly. "We know that many customers particularly enjoy watching the world go by outside in the spring sunshine."

If that sounds like your cup of tea (or coffee), then Cuckfield Corner House Café is open 7.30am-4pm Monday to Friday, 8am-4pm on Saturdays and from 9.30am-3pm on Sundays.




This is a very good book and an interesting piece of literature. It explores bravery, courage and a journey away from home. I would recommend this book to an older audience. I would give this book ten out of ten!
