



If you own or manage a business of any size or shape you will certainly be aware of what a website is but, interestingly, even in 2016, you may still not actually have one set up. According to a survey carried out two years ago by a marketing company in the US, 52% of small businesses did not have a website*1. This seems a shocking statistic. Is this you?

A home page should help a visitor to quickly understand your business and realise you're relevant to them

Include: Who you are; What is it that you do/provide; What the benefits are that your business offers; Who your typical customers are; A Call to Action

2. Have a 'Call to Action' on each page

Guide visitors to know exactly what it is you want them to do next (call for a quote, sign-up for a discount, email for a call back, complete a contact form, sign-up to a newsletter etc.)

3. Images make or break a site

Make sure all images are high-res; Include images of you and your team; Include images of the environment your customers can expect if they visit you; If using generic images choose those that really help to describe what your business is.

4. Include your address and a map

Most important for local businesses with local clients. Help them to find you easily.

5. Provide as much of your personality through words and tone as possible

This helps to differentiate you from another business with a similar offer.

6. Include logos of awards, associations, qualifications, partners and/or suppliers

This helps with credibility and reassurance regardless of what stage your business is in.

7. Include testimonials

A customer providing their view of working with you can be powerful. Use video if possible.

8. Include an About Us Page

Sharing the background of you, your team and the business itself can help with differentiation and add reassurance of your expertise.

9. Include a price page

Even if it just contains examples or explains through how you price your services.

10. Include links to social media channels

Help visitors to know where and how else they can engage with you.

News from Cuckfield Parish Council

January 2016

New Parish Office Staff

Following a successful recruitment campaign, the Parish Council welcomes Samantha (Sam) Heynes as part-time Assistant Clerk who joins Annette and Jane in the Parish Office team. Sam will assist in day to day administration and projects covering the many existing and new assets owned and run by the Parish Council and additional responsibilities it has taken on. You will see under our contact details we have also increased the Parish Office opening hours to expand service to residents.

Roads & Traffic

High Street Pavement

The Parish Council met with West Sussex County Council Highways Department and the County Councillor last November to progress repairs and a longer term solution to the unsatisfactory condition of the pavement between Leyton Lea and the entrance to the Recreation Ground. The Highways Department, at that meeting, gave a commitment to progress works to install bollards and repair the pavement and quotations were being sort. The Parish Council await an update on progress but will continue to pursue a resolution.

Traffic Calming Schemes

The London Road Pelican Crossing was successfully installed during the October half term and is operational. Following on with its traffic calming schemes, the Parish Council has now approved a project to take forward proposals for traffic calming measures in London Lane. Forming part of the Central Mid-Sussex Infrastructure Programme, the project will look at a detailed design based on earlier scheme proposals incorporating build outs and speed cushions along London Lane. Initial consultation with Sussex Police is taking place and further information can be obtained from the Parish Office. Updates will be given at Roads and Traffic Committee meetings and in future newsletters.

2016 is an important year for Cuckfield as the village celebrates the 50th anniversary of the Independent State and the Annual Mayoral Elections.

Still at the heart of village life, today's Independent State of Cuckfield, or ISOC, remains the village's main fundraising organisation, and has provided a lifeline for many local groups and charities. Over the next few issues of Cuckfield Life we will look at how the organisation has evolved, including significant stories from the past 50 years and recollections from some of the former Mayors. We will also tell you how you can get involved in this year's celebrations and elections.

With its corrupt election process and blatant vote rigging, the annual elections for the Mayor of the Independent State of Cuckfield are a light-hearted and somewhat frivolous affair. But when the organisation was formed back in 1966 it was no laughing matter as the village was locked in a serious dispute with the local council.

The dispute centred around the Cuckfield Donkey Racing club, set up in 1951 by Peter and Phyl Bowring and George Hall, which had traditionally held Donkey races on Easter Monday, first at Park Barn Farm (where Warden Park now stands) and later at Mill Hall Farm at Whitemans Green.

However, in 1966, the land at Mill Hall was compulsorily purchased by the local authority as recreation land and permission to stage the event was refused as it was thought that the donkey's hoofs would damage the newly laid out rugger pitches.

"We were completely flabbergasted," Peter Bowring later recalled. "Not only did many local good causes rely on our annual contribution to their funds, the events had already been advertised and expenses had been incurred. We had to think quickly of some other means of raising the money.

"At the time Rhodesia had recently declared UDI (Unilateral Declaration of Independence) and so it was a short step for us to declare our own independence to demonstrate our annoyance with the local council for not allowing us to use our own fields for good causes. We would show the world that the Independent State of Cuckfield cared for the old, the handicapped and the needy within its boundaries even if the local council did not!"

On 2nd May 1966 the village declared independence. "The Government have failed, the County Council has

failed and the urban District Council is a complete flop!" declared the first ISOC committee.

The first elections for Mayor of the newly formed State invited 'the whole world' to take part and each vote cost sixpence. (In 1971, following decimalisation, votes cost 2½p.)There were no limits to how many times each elector could vote and, like today, the candidate with the most votes (raising the most for charity) was declared Mayor of Cuckfield. In the early days candidates were either landlords of local public houses – 'publicans', or residents from the village – 'sinners'.

Residents could also support the ISOC by buying Passports for five shillings. Benefits included reduced tickets to the Mayor's Ball and free admission to the Bank Holiday Donkey races. During the first year 500 passports were sold.

Cuckfield's first Mayor was Joe Mitchell, landlord of the White Harte Inn. With 2,945 votes, it was a victory for the Publican party over the Sinners. In second place, and picking up the title of Mayor's Alderman, was 'Sinner' Mike Bowring and in third was publican Teddy Johnson who became Mace Bearer.

The Mayoral election raised £250, while the Donkey Fair and Masquerade and Tramps Ball in the evening brought in a further £600. The money was divided between the Cuckfield Old Folk's Fund and the Cuckfield Youth Club Premises Appeal Fund.

The 'robing of the Mayor' ceremony was performed by actor Wilfrid Hyde White, who was appearing in Lady Windermere's Fan at Brighton's Theatre Royal, and the chain of office was placed around his neck by Miss Cuckfield, 16 year old Jennifer Woods.

The Donkey Fair, the first to be held with no donkey races, included many of the events familiar to today's





Cuckoo Fair, with the exception of a 'piano smashing' competition in which contestants had to demolish a piano into pieces small enough to post through a letter box! The contest was won by the team from Cuckfield Youth Club smashing and posting the piano in just under 16 minutes!

Cuckfield's second mayor was Mike Bowring, son of the election's returning officer Peter Bowring. The local paper reported that this led to the result being announced by Cuckfield's 'Minister for External Affairs and Lord Chancellor' Laurie Cox.

On Mayor-making Day 'foreign' motorists unable to produce passports were held to ransom in a bid to raise extra funds.

Those attending the celebrations also heard how the Cuckfield 'Foreign Secretary' George Stevenson had written to the Prime Minister Harold Wilson, Deputy George Brown, and opposition leader Edward Heath inviting them to attend the celebrations. Replies from all three, congratulating the State and wishing the 'ancient town' every success for the Lord Mayor's Show, were read out on Radio Cuckfield.

The Mayor's Show took place a week after the elections and, like today, included a procession through the village and featured the State's own Fire Brigade with vintage fire engine.

The pomp and ceremony saw the Mayor arrive in a 'state coach' accompanied by a household cavalry of donkeys and Mace bearer Ron Knight knocking on the door of the Talbot three times saying: "I call on the Alderman to produce the keys of this ancient town and bring refreshments for His Worship the Mayor".

Outgoing mayor Joe Mitchell came out carrying the key on a crimson cushion accompanied by Edgar Dudley with a pint of beer. It's a tradition still followed and much enjoyed today!

The Mayor's procession was later accompanied by Cromwellian and Royalist troops from the Sealed Knot Society, of which Mayor George Stevenson was a member. This also led to the group starting the battle of Cuckfield in 1971.

By 1969 the ISOC was issuing its own stamps and banknotes. Designed by George Stevenson, the stamps were used in addition to normal postage stamps and featured a cuckoo with a gold crown above its head and the words Greetings from Cuckfield. The bank notes were worth five cuckoos - equal to 5p - and were valid in the village shops.

Other merchandise included ties, cuff links and brooches all featuring the cuckoo motif.

In the years that followed, the mayoral election raised money for many village charities, including Cuckfield Cottage Homes for the Elderly, Old People's Christmas Dinner Fund, scouts, guides, churches and sports clubs, Orchard House, Cuckfield Hospital and Mill Hall School for Deaf Children.

The State also collected 96,000 Green Shield Stamps (75 books) to trade for to a television set and two kettles for the village's Cottage Homes.

Elections have always been corrupt. In 1972 Geordie Jack Swain snatched victory from Phyl Bowring, who was aiming to become the first woman Mayor, when seconds before the deadline a supporter produced a cheque for £30 - enough to secure victory.

However, Phyl was victorious the following year winning with a clear margin of 344 votes. She also broke another tradition by replacing the customary Mayor's pint of beer with cider!

In 1975, Cuckfield saw the first Mayoral marriage when reigning mayor and manager of the Kings Head Hotel, Ted Murphy married his fiancée Christine.

In 1977, the Queen's Silver Jubilee year, the cost of votes was reduced to a penny and candidates appealed to voters with a series of poems, with winning candidate retired postmaster Frank Christopher polling 7,254 votes.

In 1978 records were broken when 75 year old retired GP Dr "Cocky" Farr managed to rig 16,321 votes to become Mayor, almost 6,000 votes ahead of his nearest rival.

The record was swept aside in 1979 when Ansty Cross landlord Mr Keith Randall collected 63,000 votes - more than twice the population of the village! The event raised £1,500 for charities.

Ways of raising money and buying votes gradually became more inventive, from raffling whisky to selling Cuckfield passports in America, and in 1982 Leslie Fleming won by nearly 100,000 votes.

By 1986, the 20th anniversary of the Mayoral election, the Independent State raised more than £11,000 which benefitted more than 55 local good causes and was firmly established as Cuckfield's biggest and most publicised annual event.

Organisers of this year's Cuckfield Christmas Tree Festival are celebrating the most successful year yet, raising more than £11,000 for charity.

The event, now in its 13th year, was supported by 79 local organisations, clubs and societies each decorating and lighting a tree in Holy Trinity Church.

"As happens every year, there were some really inventive themes and we are grateful to all those who worked really hard on their trees to make a spectacular display," said organiser Robin Goldsmith.

He added that this year's three day event attracted 3,500 visitors from Sussex and beyond. "There were frequent gasps of delight as both adults and children came through the door of the church." said Robin.

Entertainment was provided by choirs, soloists, organists and instrumentalists including The Singing Allsorts, Cuckoo Choir, U3A, Bolnore Village and Holy Trinity Primary School choirs, Father Michael Maine and the choir and music group from Holy Trinity Church.

Funds were boosted with generous donations from many of the tree decorators, including P & S Gallagher which sponsored the festival programme.

"This, coupled with the popularity of the refreshments provided throughout the weekend, enabled Holy Trinity Church to present a cheque to the Chestnut Tree House Children's hospice for £6,460, while the Church itself benefited to the tune of £5,083." Robin explained.

Since the first Christmas Tree Festival was held back in 2003 more than £56,000 has been donated to charities.







Bats and boxes

As I looked around at my Christmas cards this year I noticed how many robins were showing their cheery red breasts from table, window sill, bookcase and kitchen shelf. In past years it was angels of all shapes and sizes looking out from these same perches. In difficult times the robin buoys us up with his song and friendly presence and I am wondering if there is an unconscious need stirring in us to come closer to nature. Just a thought.

There is some really good news to share with you, not about robins but swifts and bats. You may remember the new houses being built in north Cuckfield referred to as the Ardingly Road development. Now officially Horsefield Green, the houses are almost finished and one or two are already occupied. Chatting to the site foreman he told me that all the houses have swift and bat boxes as standard. How about that for good news! 'Giving nature a home' in the words of the RSPB.

The good news doesn't stop there. It seems that there was consultation with ecologists before the building began. Bat boxes are also being installed in a wooded area in a corner of the site. Whether the ecologists were connected with the construction company I don't know. It may be that our own Cuckfield nature supporters David Mortimer and John Dickie, who undertook the biodiversity survey for the Neighbourhood Plan, were involved. The Parish Council too, of course. These boxes will help make a 'bridge' between the bat colonies in Millennium Wood and our our own New England Wood. Well done everyone!

The robin's red breast reminds me of a question I have for you about the old red phone box in the courtyard of The Talbot. Cuckfield Local feels that this could be a good resource for the village. As you lovely readers are part of the village, get your thinking caps on as to what we can do with it. The necessary permissions for us to do this have been given, so over to you. Suggestions so far are that it could be used as a book exchange centre after the necessary shelving has been built or that local groups could use it for a month at a time to promote events, campaigns and competitions. Simple kitchens

DESIGN AT HOME

We visited Standen House in East Grinstead just before Christmas. The Christmas trees enhancing the warm and cosy Arts and Crafts interiors adding to the lived-in look, glancing back to the past. Every time we visit a grand old house through the National Trust I always enjoy looking at the kitchen. Their simple interiors exude an air of warmth and tranquillity with their soft lines, utilitarian free-standing furnishings and plain décor. Scrubbed wooden tables, painted dressers, magnificent built-in cooking ranges, displays of pans, collections of copper jelly moulds and tableware. Life below stairs must have been hard work for the staff in that bygone age.

On this occasion the perhaps more humble kitchen at Standen made me think how different life is today with sparkly, open plan modern kitchens being the heart of the home, where guests gravitate to at parties, families relax, children play and there is an absence of staff.

What will 2016 bring for new trends in kitchen design? A safe, well organised space with plenty of storage is the way to go, with plenty of natural light and eco friendly fittings where possible. Green choices include units made from reclaimed wood, salvaged wooden panelling, recycled glass splashbacks and work surfaces, bamboo work surfaces, chairs made from recycled plastic and second-hand furnishings.

If a vintage kitchen is your choice, you might find original free-standing units to fit in with your scheme either online or at an antiques fair. Original pieces from the 50s, 60s or 70s will make a fantastic statement and with reclaimed stained glass windows, from your chosen era, made into wall cupboards the result is a unique kitchen.

A trend for modern kitchens in 2016 is to become more minimal. After de-cluttering, the remaining kitchen necessities are stored behind glossy cupboard doors, achieving clean lines and a sleek appearance. White quartz work surfaces are free from all appliances and the splashback clearly visible without objects in the way. Sometimes it is so minimal that it looks like no-one lives



there! Add to the look with open shelves displaying only useful objects such as matching cups, the same white as the wall to fade into the background. Light the shelves from behind with LEDs.

Mixing metals in the kitchen is also forecast to be on trend for 2016 and will enhance an industrial space. Incorporate copper taps, pans or a fantastic beaten copper statement hood over a steel cooker and steel appliances. Wooden seating and flooring with industrial origins add character and the different textures in exposed brickwork and concrete work surfaces contribute to the look.

Lighting is of major importance in any space. Place statement pendant lamps in groups or individually over a peninsula worktop or island to enhance the focal point and LED lamps to light task areas. Copper lamp shades that have a filigree stencilled pattern throw fantastic shadows across the ceiling.
