Dressed up karate!

eating doughnuts on strings to assembling skeletons, a great time was had all round. A great way to end October, especially after a successful grading of seven students the previous weekend! The club trains every Wednesday evening and Saturday morning, and everyone is welcome to come along and try it out.





The hopes and dreams of rugby fans all over the country were dashed last month as host nation England made a dramatic early exit from this year's Rugby World Cup.

However, in Cuckfield spirits have been lifted by the success of the country's under 20s squad and, in particular, local hero James Chisholm whose stunning performance led the team to victory in the Six Nations Championship.

James, who grew up in Cuckfield, was crowned Man of the Match following the historic game – the first to be played at Brighton's Amex stadium – and went on to lead the team to the World Cup final in Italy. It's been a remarkable year for the 19 year old, who first picked up a rugby ball on Whiteman's Green at just four years old!

A talent for sport certainly runs in the Chisholm family and James, the youngest of three brothers, was kicking a ball from an early age.

"Dad had a couple of years as a professional footballer with Everton and went on to coach the England U18 team, so I played a lot of football," said James. But instead of following in his father's footsteps, James was encouraged to try other sports.

"Dad and mum wanted their boys to play a sport they knew nothing about so they could have no influence over it," James added. "I joined Haywards Heath Rugby Club at Whitemans Green and was hooked! Rugby was always my favourite game – I was never very good at football!"

A student at Warden Park Academy, James' talent for rugby was soon recognised and he was selected to captain the school team. He also excelled at field sports and became Sussex U18 high jump champion.

In 2010 James had his first taste of success when Warden Park Under 15s reached the quarter-finals of the Daily Mail Schools' w Cup. "We took on Wellington College and lost by five points but felt we should have won," James recalled.

"It was the best run the school had ever had and it was very upsetting at the time because it could have been us playing at Twickenham in the final. We went to watch but felt it should have been us instead."

After leaving Warden Park, James studied biology, physical education and a BTEC in Sport at Brighton College, where he also became captain of the first XV rugby team.

Up to the age of 15, James had played at centre but a move to 'blindside flanker' proved to be a turning point in his rugby career, leading to selection for Sussex, London & South East and England U16A and U17.

James took inspiration from Lawrence Dallaglio. "I used to love watching him. I wanted to run into blokes and get stuck in like he did!" He also credits HHRFC's John Graham and his school coach Steve Heaton with putting him firmly on the path to success.







In 2013 James' rugby career reached new heights when he was selected to captain the under 18 England squad. On his debut match and wearing the No. 8 shirt, James led the team to an impressive 57-13 win over Scotland at Darlington. He also led the side to a 27-22 victory over hosts France at Grenoble in the subsequent FIRA/AER final, scoring three tries in the tournament.

Later that year James captained the team in a tour of South Africa, scoring another two touchdowns in the opening match. He went on to captain the side in all three games that produced wins over Wales by 17-15 and France by 12-8.

During this time James had also secured a coveted place at the Harlequins Academy, joining his older brother Ross who plays at first team level for the club. "It's really comforting to do something special with a person you are really close to," said James, who continued his success following a move to the England Under 20 squad.

His maiden try for England U20 was against Scotland at Galashiels in February 2014 and he shared in the side's IRB Junior World Championship triumph in New Zealand the following June, playing in all five matches.

He scored two tries in the 63-3 pool win over Italy, added another when England lost 21-15 to Wales at Colwyn Bay in the opening game of the Six Nations Championship and made his fifth touchdown at this level against Scotland. He also scored tries against France and South Africa during the World Championship in Italy this June.

But perhaps the highlight of his career came this summer when James was named as the BMW Man of the Match following England's victory in the Under 20's Six Nations Championship. With the final held at the Amex Stadium in Brighton just weeks before the stadium played host to the first matches of the Rugby World Cup, the victory was even sweeter!

"It was amazing but tough at times. We knew we could win but it was tremendous to do it in Brighton," said James, who went on to be named as the World Rugby U20 Championship Player of the Year. "Winning was an awesome feeling and I was so proud of all the guys.

"We made it hard for ourselves by losing the opening game against Wales, but we regrouped and came back really strongly.

"For me, as a local guy, to play at the Amex stadium in front of an amazing crowd and get the win was pretty special. It is an experience that will definitely live long in the memory for me."

James completed the season with a magnificent performance in the Junior World Cup in Italy, where England narrowly lost to New Zealand in the final and James was awarded 'Man of the Tournament' last received by England's George Ford.

James currently lives in Surrey with both his brothers Ross and Ali but enjoys regular visits to the family home in Cuckfield. Older brother Ali, having completed a degree at Exeter University, works locally and plays semi professional rugby for Esher RFC. "It's awesome to live with my brothers – we get on really well and I couldn't wish for a better place to live," said James, who approaches this season hoping to feature in Quins premiership title aspirations.

James hopes the success of the Under 20s team and the high profile Rugby World Cup matches at Brighton will encourage a new generation of rugby players in Sussex.

"The World Cup opening games provided an amazing opportunity for people in Sussex to come and watch some high-level teams," said James.

"Sussex doesn't really have a rugby team at a top level but hopefully this will help Brighton, Worthing and other local clubs open their doors to some new faces."

Sadly the England senior team failed to emulate the Under 20s success and rugby fans all over Great Britain were heartbroken to see all four teams leave the tournament before the semi-finals.

But with the youth team going from strength to strength, and with players like James Chisholm, the future looks bright for the next World Cup in four year's time when Cuckfield could have its own special reason to celebrate!



Cuckfield resident David Spear is waiting for his chance to join 699 others on a once in a lifetime trip into space with Virgin Galactic. David signed up for the first commercial flight in 2008 and, after forking out a lot of money, he fed his desire to one day have an astronautic experience. Since then he has been subjected to all kinds of training regimes and trips around the world in preparation for this 'long haul flight'. I wonder what the plane food is like...

Astrophysicist Professor Stephen Hawking supports the programme and David was lucky enough to be one of the few who were able to attend a recent special event at Cambridge University to learn more about what scientists want to achieve in the future. The Virgin Galactic programme is driven by the deeply human need to explore the universe, to generate new and lasting technologies and to create a better future for the human race by heroically opening a new frontier. The programme now has a former space shuttle pilot on board too.

With trips to NASTAR in Philadelphia, America, David had to undergo tests and flight training exercises to prepare his mind and body. For example, he has been spun in a centrifuge up to 6.5G - this prepared him for the dynamic forces of take-off and re-entry. By enduring this, it taught him how to stay conscious and it is very similar to what American fighter pilots do at the same training facility. Expressing excitement David said: "Our future flight commences at 50,000 feet when we are dropped from the mother ship. Then we will rocket to 368,000 feet. Our top speed will be about 2,600mph!"

As a child in April 1961 David saw a news clip of Yuri Gagarin, the first man in space. He turned to his dad and asked: "What's space?" His dad replied: "It's above the sky son. You can't breathe out there – that's why they wear the space suit." Four year old David looked out of the window, then back at the television. This was the moment David says he 'signed up'. From then on he was hooked and watched every space flight with a resounding urge that one day he would become an astronaut.

"In 1961 I watched Yuri Gagarin in awe as the first man in space."

With the explorer gene passed down from generations of men, David has proven to be a resilient and courageous adventurer. Aside from becoming an astronaut, he has completed the Inca Trail in Peru, climbed Mount Roraima (the legendary mountain in Conan Doyle's book 'The Land that Time Forgot') in Venezuela, trekked to Mount Everest Base Camp and, if that wasn't enough, he has led treks in remote parts of Nepal – while dodging the odd rhino here and there! While in Peru, David followed in history's footsteps and visited the copper mines that his great grandfather worked at in the 1890s and, using his old pictures, David stood on the spot in which his grandfather had stood 105 years before. He is like Marco Polo and Neil Armstrong rolled into one!

David has ongoing support from his family and friends. He said that his daughters are not surprised that he wants to embark on this next adventure, as they have seen him gallivant around the world completing these amazing adventures. What do people say to David about his plans? "Most folk say: 'go for it, you only live once!"

VILLAGE GREEN

Just recently I was spending a few days on the northern island of Orkney, Waterproofs, boots and warm clothes were the order of the day or so we thought. Surprise, surprise, we were blessed with two days of clear weather. The seas and lochs were glassy calm, the sun warm and the scenery heart achingly beautiful. Hearing a skein of geese honking as they flew in the distance made me really appreciate how vitally important it is to hold our ground here in Sussex in the face of the encroaching concrete carpet and cloned housing estates. I am not BANANA, Build Nothing Anywhere Near Anyone, but there is a line to be drawn one feels. Something I discovered whilst chatting to locals is that Orkney generates much of its energy from renewables and is often able to export electricity. The first wind turbine was tested there in the 1950s and now there are 470 on the islands. It is also home to the European Marine Energy Centre; the world's first and only real-sea facility for testing machines that generate electricity from waves and tides.

That is really good news but, closer to home, I have to tell you of a 'spanner in the works'! Many of you have been diligently collecting your plastic tops and lids for a long time now and bringing them to the Cuckfield Market for specialist recycling. Thank you so much. You have made a real difference. Sadly, the gentleman who has been taking our small plastic items to the recycling company in Worksop is changing direction and will no longer be able to offer us this facility. As from December we are only taking standard red, blue and green milk bottle tops and nothing else. The good news is that we can now put large plastic and metal lids such as those from coffee jars, margarine pots, large cosmetic tubs, jam or mayonnaise jars in our blue bins, so all is not lost. Please remove them from the container and give them a quick clean. It is still a big NO to the small plastic tops from milk and soft drink bottles and other small items. They can fall through the holes in the large revolving drums and get mixed with glass, causing a problem. Please do not screw the standard milk bottle tops on to the empty bottles as they are squashed in the collecting vehicles, the tops pop off and the problem occurs. They are too small to be processed correctly by the sorting machinery. Now you know as much as I do.

On a brighter note, the next Cuckfield Local Food Market is on 12th December, our special Christmas Market. Come and celebrate with us at the Talbot between 9.30am-12.30pm. You can find yummy Christmas treats, buy wildlife friendly pressies, enjoy meeting friends and soak up the atmosphere. A warming drink in The Talbot? Not a bad idea.



A simple postcard of Cuckfield Church, sent from a young soldier billeted in the village to his mother in Peckham, was the inspiration behind the Armistice Day exhibition at Cuckfield Museum.

The postcard came to light earlier this year when a group of former evacuees gathered in the village for their annual lunch. "We were looking through a collection of postcards belonging to Sylvie Gray, when one of the church caught our eye," said Phillipa Malins from the Museum.

"It was sent in December 1914 and sounded as if it were from a soldier billeted in Cuckfield. We knew it was likely he was from the 2nd Btn of the 8th City of London Regt Post Office Rifles who were in the village training for six months between November 1914 and May 1915 before leaving for France."

Eager to find out more, Sarah Mees, the daughter-in-law of evacuee George Mees and a researcher at Kew, offered to do some work on the sender of the postcard, taking the name and address of his mother (Ma in the message) in Peckham as her starting point.

"She found that the sender was George Gates and his mother, Mrs Sinnamon, had been widowed and had remarried in 1910," said Phillipa. "It's interesting to see that George misspelt the new surname of his mother!"

Sarah found that George was 20 when the Great War started and had been working in the Post Office as a Telegraph Messenger boy, hence joining the Post Office Rifles. He also had a sister Helena who could have been the Nellie in the card – the name was frequently shortened. Sarah also found that George survived the war, having been commissioned as a 2nd Lt into the Royal Welch Fusiliers.

"He worked all his life for the Post Office, becoming a Supervisor," added Phillipa. "He married and had two children and died in 1970. It was fascinating to build up a picture of a life from this message on the back of a postcard!"

Delighted with what they had discovered, the museum volunteers took a wider look at the 6 months that the Post Office Rifles spent in Cuckfield. "Because they were billeted with families, the village became very attached to them," said Phillipa. "The Regiment put on entertainments for the children at Christmas – we have the invitation to a little girl called Daisy Keep. The villagers were allowed daily rations by the Army for the soldiers and we also have the billeting letter which went out."

She added that the amounts of meat and bread were generous (1lb meat and $1^{1}/_{4}$ lb bread) and families benefited from the extra food.

The exhibition also includes photos of soldiers billeted with local families and the PO Rifles being assembled in the middle of the High St!



"It looks as if they're not quite ready and there is an atmosphere of familiarity with the children milling around."

In 1968 a plaque was placed in the churchyard to remember the men who didn't come back. Soldiers who had been billeted in 1914/15 returned for the ceremony and one met with the family who had looked after them so many years before and the exhibiton includes press cuttings from the event.

Also on display are two diaries from the Gallipoli campaign, 1915/16. "They were discovered recently in a house clearance in London Lane and had belonged to Col Robert Sayer who had been a Gunner at Gallipoli in the 26th Battery RFA, 17th Brigade, 29th Division," said Phillipa. "One is the official military diary for the Battery and the other is the personal, pencil written diary of one of the officers, 2nd Lt Ralph Chalkley.

"We are displaying the pages in the diaries which describe the terrible chaos of the retreat from Gallipoli in January 1916 when equipment had to be abandoned, efforts to blow up the equipment failed and horses had to be shot."

The Battery subsequently moved to Flanders where Ralph Chalkley was Mentioned in Dispatches and Robert Sayer was awarded the DCM and granted a commission in 1917.

"He went on to become a career soldier and was awarded the OBE as Regimental Paymaster for the Royal Army Pay Corps," added Phillipa.

Andrea King researched the life of Ralph Chalkley and found that he went to Sherborne School. A photo (right) shows him in the Officer Training Corps in 1912 when he was 16. This extremely young looking boy would be at war in two years time! Again, he survived the war.

"It's nice to think that the three men we've looked at in the display: George Gates, William Sayer and Ralph Chalkley, all survived."

The display will stay up until 12th December when the musuem closes for the winter at 1pm.

Dear Ma,

We were due to go to Cromer (East coast) next Sat: just been cancelled on account of bad weather. We were picked from the C of L (City of London) Regts as being the smartest. Evidently we were going to help defend the coast. This is a poor picture of the church we attend each Sun morn. A very old but good building. Please order ½ doz more photos. There is a great demand among the fellows. We are all exchanging dials (small portrait photos swapped as momentos between soldiers before leaving for the front). Will let Nellie know later of her visit. Find times of trains meanwhile.

What leather is the right leather for me?

DESIGN AT HOME

Shiny, worn or battered, distressed, textured or smooth, real or fake, what kind of leather would you like to adorn your new leather sofa? The choice comes from a wide list, from fake to the best quality leather, affecting price, look and life expectancy. If you are thinking about splashing out on a leather sofa the list below may be helpful.

Tanned leather is a natural, durable material but fake (faux) leather does have its plus points. Combinations of pvc (polyvinyl chloride), polyester, polyurethane and cotton are processed into many forms of faux leather. Simulated cowhide leather, crocodile skin, lizard and snake ensure that the real thing comes to no harm and can be generated in amazing natural and unnatural colours, resulting in an affordable and eco-friendly material. Produced in the 1920s, the first fake leather was composed of PVC but unfortunately the material was too artificial and sticky. Improvement was made in the 1970s by adding pores to the fake leather, rendering it breathable. Bad examples meant that the top coating of fake leather parted company with the fabric backing, leaving areas of fabric on the sofa and pieces of fake leather on someone's back.

Leather sofas used to bring to mind heavy buttoned chesterfields covered in shiny leather but nowadays good

quality leather can drape beautifully over all styles of furniture, adding warmth, style and comfort to your home.

The lowest priced leather is PU leather, also known as bi-cast leather. Split leather is the leather left behind when the top layer with the grain is peeled off. PU leather is made by taking this bottom layer and adding a polyurethane topping with a fake grain, making it shiny and wipeable. The polyurethane surface means that the PU leather doesn't age in the same attractive way as cowhide leather does and is not recommended for areas of high use. PU leather can have a smell of plastic rather than the lovely aroma of leather.

An online supplier lists the following grades:

A low price leather sofa equals low grade leather if it is covered in buffalo hide, which is really pig or goat leather.

The most basic of decent leather (cowhide) starts with corrected grain which has a protective finish.

A step up is semi-aniline leather which is softer, smoother and more luxurious. Double thickness leather has a heavy grain and is ideal for every day living.

Natural waxed leather gets its appearance from natural scarring, cuts and scrapes that the animal has had during life, giving it a natural look. Aniline leather is the best leather, the softest and most luxurious leather.



The sure touch of a maestro at the keyboard

The recent concert sponsored by the Friends of the Holy Trinity Church was entitled 'Toccata', the Italian term originally used for a musical composition for a keyboard instrument designed to exhibit the performer's touch and technique.

The Reverend Michael Maine, Vicar of Cuckfield and virtuoso organist, certainly gave vivid meaning to the term as he put the venerable church organ through its paces in a programme so varied and colourful that it is conceivable that every stop of the organ was usefully employed! The beautiful setting of the thirteenth-century stone church in the early autumn sunlight provided its superb acoustics to a recital which combined familiar Toccata classics from Bach and Widor.

A particular favourite of both the capacity audience and (I suspect) the performer was Elgar's Pomp and Circumstance Military March, which had been arranged for organ by the Music Director at Truro Cathedral where Reverend Maine was once a chorister.

Three pieces, however, made a special impact on your correspondent. First was a lesser-known composition, Allegro Grazioso by Brighton-born Frank Bridges. Bridges composed mainly for strings and this was clearly apparent in the subtle evolution and lyricism of the central theme, interpreted by the Reverend Maine with sensitive mastery of the organ's 'quiet' stops. Second,

a particularly moving rendition was Reverend Maine's sung performance of Quilter's setting of Tennyson's 1847 Sonnet Now Sleeps the Crimson Petal. This sensitively performed lyrical paean to nature's beauty at twilight could not have enjoyed a more evocative setting than the fading rays of afternoon sunlight through the glorious stained glass windows of Holy Trinity Church. It has to be conceded, however, that one of the things we all go to organ recitals to hear is the thunderous resonance of the loud pipes.

The third item (which received equally thunderous applause) was, of course, Bach's Toccata and Fugue in D Minor. It must be a challenge to find something new for an interpretation of this seminal organ work. The Reverend Maine, however, certainly succeeded in a truly chiaroscuro rendition which shook the foundations of the church with its strident opening bars and then wove the intricate contrapuntal phrases of the Fugue with a masterly touch on pedals and manuals. Paul Goldfinch, Chairman of Friends of the Holy Trinity Church expressed the warm appreciation of all attendees for what had been an inspiring and uplifting programme. Guy Berkeley, the ever-enthusiastic sponsor and originator of the Friends' series of Concerts, expressed his confidence that events like this will continue to expand the thriving membership of the Friends of the Holy Trinity Church.
